



DIRECTOR'S NOTES

RANAE BUTLER



Six Degrees of Separation, written by John Guare, was published in 1990 and had a successful Broadway run before being made into a film in 1993. It is an intellectual comedy/drama/mystery with heady themes and hidden treasures for those willing to step inside the world of the play. My intention with these notes is to provide you with a few clues for viewing. But first, a note about the thrust

set, a style chosen for its intimacy. There are three areas to familiarize yourself with: 1. The Apartment of Ouisa and Flan Kittredge. 2. "Otherwheres" - the area of the floor that is painted in the style of Kandinski. You will notice that the "Otherwheres" begin to encroach on the apartment as the play proceeds. 3. The Street - these are the aisles directly in front of you which will frequently be inhabited by actors talking directly to you. Please place any belongings under your seat!

Your Questions/Clues for viewing: Over the past 34 years, the following questions ring truer than when the play was written: What happens when a lack of authentic human connection and spiritual emptiness leaves us with a hole inside ourselves? How do we try to fill that hole? Gossip? Sex? Drugs? Experiences? Good causes? Self-delusion? Who in this play is open to authentic human connection? Where are the authentic connections? The missed connections?

A double-sided abstract expressionist painting by Wassily Kandinsky serves as a visual focus on the set as well as a symbol of the themes explored in the text such as chaos/control, two sides to every story, and the imagination. Guare taps into the painter's abstract expressionist style that "tried to unlock the unconsciousness of humanity". Kandinsky painted unrecognized shapes which requires the viewer to assign meaning to the abstract. How do the characters in this play assign meaning to the young black man who walks into their homes? Why do they allow him into their homes?

When this stranger delivers a monologue about the imagination, he sets in motion a series of events that alters the future of our characters, "The imagination. It's there to sort out your nightmare, to show you the exit from the maze of your nightmare, to transform the nightmare into dreams, that become your bedrock. If we do not listen to that voice, it dies, it shrivels, it vanishes. The imagination is not our escape. On the contrary, the imagination is the place we are all trying to get to......The imagination. That's God's gift to make the act of self-examination bearable." Who will answer the call for self-examination in this play and where will that lead them? Who are the con artists in this play? Who is hustling and for what?

The play is also an exploration of race. Originally cast with only one person of color, I have increased that number to include characters in positions of authority, characters as witnesses to concerns of race, and characters of color in positions of low and high status.

BIOGRAPHIES

The actors in the play, and Assistant Director, Cortney White, have been instrumental in discussions and discoveries around this theme. I owe a debt of gratitude for their insights and lived experiences. Since this is a play demanding self-examination, what are your thoughts about how race impacts the decisions made in this story?

Hopefully these questions give you a head start in exploring the many puzzles this play has to offer. Untangling the mysteries has been an important part of our artistic process and I couldn't have hoped to do it with a better team. Enjoy!

JOHN GUARE (Author) received the Award of Merit from the American Academy of Arts and Letters for his plays The House of Blue Leaves, Rich and Famous, Marco Polo Sings a Solo, Landscape of the Body, and Bosoms and Neglect. The House of Blue Leaves, which won the New York Drama Critics Circle Award as Best American Play of 1971, received four Tony awards in its triumphant revival in 1986 at Lincoln Center. He wrote the lyrics and won a Tony for his book of Two Gentlemen of Verona, produced by the New York Shakespeare Festival, which also won the Tony for Best Musical of 1972. He collaborated with Milos Forman on the screenplay of the Czech director's first American film, Taking Off, which won the jury prize at the Cannes festival in 1971. His screenplay for Louis Malle's Atlantic City won the New York, Los Angeles, and National Film Critics Circle Award as well as an Oscar nomination. His series of plays on nineteenth century America, Women and Water, Gardenia, and Lydie Breeze, have been performed in New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, San Francisco, Washington, D.C., London, and Australia. Yale Repertory produced Moon Over Miami in their 1988-1989 season. Six Degrees of Separation won the 1990 New York Drama Critics Circle Award for Best Play, the Hull Warriner Award, and the Obie Award, and is published by Vintage/Random House. In London, Six Degrees of Separation opened at the Royal Court Theatre and transferred to the West End and was nominated for two Olivier Awards. Six Degrees of Separation has been produced in Australia, South Africa, Istanbul, Japan, Germany, Sweden, and Israel. The film version of the play, directed by Fred Schepisi, was released in December 1993. Mr. Guare's play Four Baboons Adoring The Sun, directed by Sir Peter Hall and produced by Lincoln Center at the Vivian Beaumont Theater in 1992, was nominated for four Tony Awards, including Best Play, and is published by Random House/Vintage. Mr. Guare is a council member of the Dramatists Guild, the organization representing more than seven thousand playwrights, lyricists, and composers in America and Great Britain. He is co-editor of The Lincoln Center Library for the Performing Arts. In 1989, the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters elected him a member.

RANAE BUTLER (Director) is a theatre educator and Director of Fine Arts for area programs. She knows that the collaborative process of creating theatre with a team of designers, crew, and actors to tell a story about our shared humanity is a personally rewarding endeavor and a profound way to serve the community. A lifelong student of theatre, Ranae holds a BA from PFW and an MFA in Theatre from Brandeis University where she studied under the great teachers, Ted Kazanoff and David Wheeler. Her greatest joy is her family.



JULIE DONNELL (Ouisa) has appeared in over 40 roles in theater and opera and on several Fort Wayne stages. She was last seen at the Civic Theatre as Sonia in Vanya and Sonia and Masha and Spike. Prior to that, Julie played Katherine Brandt in 33 Variations. Other Civic credits include Helen Stott in And a Nightingale

Sang, Sister Amnesia in *Nunsense*, and Helga ten Dorp in *Deathtrap*. She teaches French, Applied Voice, and Diction at PFW and has translated the German play, *Der tollste Tag*, a loose adaptation of *The Marriage of Figaro*, into English.

BOB AHLERSMEYER (Flan) received Anthony Awards for his performances in A Few Good Men (Lt. Kaffee), Avenue Q (Trekkie), The Farnsworth Invention (Sarnoff), The Drowsy Chaperone (Man in Chair), and The Complete Works of Shakespeare (Abridged). Other roles include The Twilight of the Golds (David



Gold) and It's a Wonderful Life (George Bailey) with FPT; The Producers (Leo Bloom) with Civic; All My Sons (Chris Keller) with IPFW; and Frost/Nixon (Jim Reston) and Blithe Spirit (Charles Condomine) with Arena. He wrote, directed, and starred in the feature, Is This Seat Taken. Love to Nolan and Cat.




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
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
